Georgia Certificate of Sentence Completion

OFF PAPER = you have completed incarceration, parole, and probation.

What is a Certificate of Sentence Completion?

- A Certificate of Sentence Completion and Discharge (Certificate) demonstrates that a person with a felony conviction is no longer under correctional control and has completed their sentence.
- Issued by the Department of Community Supervision (DCS) under administrative policy (DCS Policy 4.108).

How can it be used?

- Helps people with felony convictions establish their sentence is complete for **prospective employers, landlords, lenders, and schools**.
- While not required for **voting**, a Certificate can help people who are having trouble registering to vote demonstrate eligibility. See GJP.org/voting for more information about voting rights.
- Peace of mind for individuals with convictions and for victims that **the sentence is truly complete**.
- Satisfies government or private agencies that a person has met all obligations of their sentence and is eligible for further **assistance from public and private agencies**.

Eligibility

- Felony sentence is complete, including parole and probation.
